Appellations of Origin

In the United States, an appellation of origin can be either the name of:

- a state
- a county (or counties)
- an American Viticultural Area (AVA)

If a wine label mentions an AVA, 85 percent of the grapes in that wine must come from that area. There are currently 157 AVA's in the US, 94 of which are in California.

The Climate



California's climate is dramatically shaped by two mountain ranges, both running roughly north south.

The Coast Range is a series of rugged forest covered ranges, often tumbling right to the edge of the Pacific. It's a relatively low range with few peaks over 1200 meters.

The second range is the Sierra Nevada, which also parallels the coast, some 160 to 200 kilometers inland.

In between the two ranges is the Central Valley, home to many of the grapes that go into the state's value wines. Along the western side of the Coast Range, the climate is dominated by the Pacific Ocean. California has almost 2000 kilometers of Pacific coastline. Warm winters, moderately warm summers, small daily and seasonal temperature ranges, and high relative humidities are characteristic of this area.
